2007 FALL ROUNDUP OF SUMMER BLESSINGS AT GOOD SAMARITAN

"The Lord has done great things, whereof we are glad" (Psalm 126:3).

First of all we give praise for our President, Peter Radchuk's US citizenship status he will receive at the end of October, which means he has a US passport and can travel freely once again. Praise God! This has been an agonizing process over three years!



We give thanks for our group of Bible School students who were with us for the summer months of June through August. Normally they do their mission practicum on the streets of Seattle, plus preaching and singing in the surrounding churches. This group had the unique experience of ministering in Tijuana, Mexico. Their responses were that they were thankful to serve the poor people and enjoyed seeing the faces of people being transformed and eyes light up when they heard about Jesus. Traveling outside the US made all of them appreciate the fact that they were

living in America. Thirty five people went, earning money through carwashes that was used for the children's gift bags of sugar and macaroni. They put on several church services as well as doing practical work. One of the young men students, Valeriy, pleads with us, "Please help others in need."

In midsummer, Peter (traveling on his Ukrainian passport) and his wife Nadia and their two teenaged children went to Ukraine. They started their tour in Kiev, where Franklin Graham was holding crusades. They were surprised at the large numbers of people who turned out in spite of the cold, rainy weather, and thousands accepted the Lord. The well known Ukrainian soloist from that crusade traveled to W. Ukraine for the crusades Peter led in their home town of Rovno. They also visited orphanages, held meetings in churches and traveled to E. Ukraine to bring support to a rehabilitation center and other ministries.

It was Nadia's first time back to her homeland in ten years and she saw many changes; better roads, gas stations with bathrooms and mini-markets, and availability of boxed juices and cheeses, particularly cottage cheese in the stores. The teens were negatively impressed with the outdoor bathrooms in the villages and the impoliteness of people not saying "excuse me", when they stepped on their feet.

Another difference she noted was the obstruction of one of their outdoor meetings in W. Ukraine. They had been given permission to hold a meeting in the public square of the city but the city government instead let a circus have the place at the same time. Peter had to arrange his meeting by the children's playground. However, after they had set up their sound system and the Ukrainian men's gospel group started singing, about 400 people came to hear the evangelical service.





Lilie, the second daughter of Peter and Nadia, a veteran of many mission trips to Ukraine, India, Argentina, and our office graphics designer, among other jobs, led a small group to Ukraine. Lena, a singer, had gone last year and Alex was one of our Bible school students.

Our gospel tent was erected near the church building in Pryluky and they passed out invitations for services throughout the day. In the evening, many youth came for tea, cookies and interaction – questions about the gospel and life. They also held children’s meetings each week and did outreach in the orphanage supplementing the regular work of one lady in the church. Orphanages for the

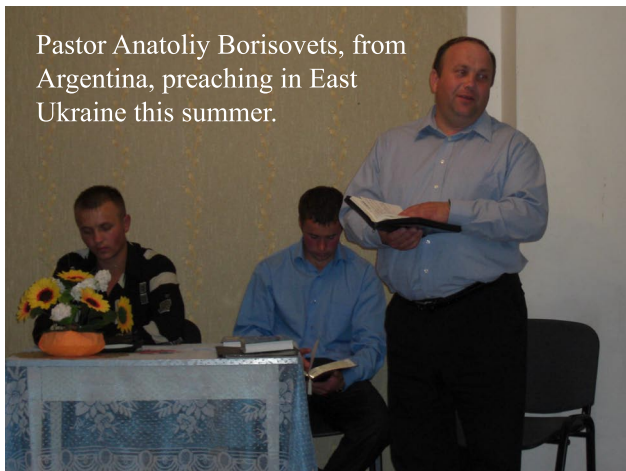
younger children are the ones most open to the gospel.

Those of you who regularly get this newsletter know that the Pryluky church was a large army officers’ building and has needed lots of remodeling. Right now, money is needed for connecting the natural gas line. The trench is dug. There is no heat except for small space heaters in the rooms. Much interior work has been finished. The latest is the apartment where the pastor Vitaliy Havula and his wife will live.

They encountered a woman living on the streets with six children. Another lady, from the church took four of them to live with her. This experience caused Anatoliy to realize he needed to build an orphanage. He says, “We know that this means new hardships financially but we believe God will help us.” He is at work on the documents to establish one in Formosa. He bought land and soon will start building a kitchen and bedrooms. Later other buildings will be added. He will be in the US for Good Samaritan’s 13 Year anniversary celebration, November 10 and 11. Please let us know if you would like him to speak in your church.

Our next group overseas trip will be in November, with Peter, Yuriy and youth from Slavic churches traveling to India. Two previous groups have gone from the Pacific Northwest and have built a boys’ orphanage for India Evangelical Teams in Bastar, Central India. Thank you to all who have donated toward that project. They need money for 25 beds.

We plan in 2008, to begin building a girls’ orphanage in another Indian state. This will cost \$30,000. A group of 30 will go and work physically on this project and also preach in the villages. Anyone who is interested is welcome to go.

We are so thankful for God’s faithful provision to us through you and pray His bountiful blessings on your lives, your families and your churches.

He is coming soon. Let us work while there is day. Lord, send forth laborers into Your harvest. May we be found faithful with what you have given us.
