MINISTRY IN UKRAINE

Tent Ministries:

In the Spring newsletter we shared our need for new transportation for the Tent Ministry. We were going to buy a red truck for \$23,000, but we ended up joining with other donors to purchase a green truck for \$28,000. It was in better condition and more suited to our needs. Thank you to everyone who prayed or gave for this project.

Tent meetings are held April through October every year. There has been such a great demand for this ministry from different regions of Ukraine, that we are faced with the need to purchase two more tents.

We need to raise the funds for a 4000 and a 1000 seat tent.

West Ukraine:

Veronika Prymak, daughter of the family that works at our "Happy family" Home for Orphans, has a spinal deformity that requires surgery. The family has received a visa to come to the USA for surgery. Mrs. Prymak and her daughter, Veronika, will be traveling to Shriners' Children's Hospital in Philadelphia, PA, for her surgery. Good Samaritan will pay for their air tickets and travel expenses, as well as provide food and lodging for their stay here.

Tent meeting in Ukraine



In June, Peter and Nadia Radchuk went to Ukraine to minister in churches, rehab centers, orphanages and to teach at the Missionary Bible School, in Rovno. A missionary conference was held at the main headquarters, in June, with participants from the USA, Germany, Mexico, India and Finland. Our full-time missionaries from came from different regions of Ukraine for this much needed time of encouragement. They were blessed and refreshed by the seminars, music and prayers.

One feature of the conference was the graduation ceremony for 21 students of the Missionary Bible School. Graduates were given a certificate, flowers, and a Bible Dictionary. There was a special prayer of dedication for full-time ministry and then they were directed toward mission stations where help is needed or to villages where they would start a new ministry.

Following this, Peter visited several regions of Ukraine, participating in outdoor services, holding seminars and meeting with the missionaries we sponsor.

In September, he returned for another evangelistic trip, for three weeks; bringing his son Peter and son in law Val Yuchimiuk, with him. They visited several cities in southern Ukraine for the first time, as well as our mission stations in E. Ukraine. They took part in a celebration of 450 years of the Peresopnytsia Gospels, the earliest known translation of the Bible into the Ukrainian language. The celebration was held in the village of Peresopnytsia, with local churches and evangelists. The President of Ukraine, Victor Yanukovych was in attendance and it was at his proclamation that celebrations were to be held all over Ukraine for this purpose.



MINISTRY IN RUSSIA

Russian Far East:

Our missionary friends in California, a team led by Natasha Fedosova, have just come back from another trip ministering in one of the most desolate places in Siberia, Magadan and Chukotka. These regions lie directly across from Alaska. While the Magadan region is similar to our Pacific Northwest, Chukotka is mostly tundra. These faithful missionaries maintain regular jobs during the winter but take time to return year after year, to minister to the children and families, mostly native, who inhabit these lands. This trip was unique, as the team consisted of two ladies and three men. It was the first time the ladies didn't have to do all of the preaching and carrying equipment.

Living mostly on fish in isolated villages, the native Christian Chukchi are as hungry for fellowship as they are for bread and tea. The team ministered evenings in churches and homes over cups of tea, in as many villages as they could reach. During the daytime they taught lessons on "Learning to be Honest", Learning to Forgive" and "The Purpose of Life." They visited orphanages where



they were able to give a Gospel presentation, along with financial and other small gifts.

Three main towns have a Christian presence that our leader Pavel established about 15 years ago. They are Anadyr (the military/capital city), Beringovskiy and Alkatvam. While traveling from Anadyr to Beringovskiy (200 km) the cross-country/ half track vehicle the team was in, broke down. Breaking down in the middle of Siberia is dangerous, often a matter of life and death. For the team it was a test of faith and trust in God. They did not lose heart, but prayed and praised God. They witnessed to the drivers, who were amazed at their calm and peace. Not far from there was a hunting cabin. They set off for the cabin in knee deep snow, reaching their destination one and one-half hours later. Heating up the stove, they settled down for the night. Their only hope was God's mercy and He provided. Another cross-country vehicle that was transporting produce from Anadyr to Beringovskiy picked them up.

The Christians there were so happy to see them. They held the first youth service there. Our team has a great desire to return and minister to that village. Also, a choir was organized. Church services were held every night for several nights. The men preached and the testimonies and prayers of the team were an unimaginable blessing for that small church.



From there they took snowmobiles to the village of Alkatvaam. They had many meetings, times of fellowship and ministered to myriads of children, most from non-Christian homes. God touched their hearts as the time flew by quickly.

Thank you to everyone who has supported the ministry in Russia over the years. This same team is planning on going back to Chukotka in October. In preparation for the trip they have purchased two snowmobiles. The only way to reach the villages is by motor boat in the summer and snowmobile in the winter. This team would so appreciate your prayers for the October trip.

“Good Samaritan” ministers in Russia by giving finances for teams going there to conduct children’s camps, etc, by sponsoring missionaries and helping with emergency financial needs. Please partner with us in Russia, if God is calling you to help with this trip or others.
